While the investments displayed volatility late in 2018, over \$11 million dollars was contributed to the Foundation, and over \$8.5 million dollars were awarded in grants, as you can see detailed inside this annual report.

Our investments have recovered significantly during the first quarter of 2019, which offsets the depreciation in the last quarter of 2018. This magnifies the need of a prudent and consistent long-term investment policy, to ensure the perpetual ability to support charitable causes in our community. Thank you to all our donors who have entrusted your philanthropic dollars to our stewardship and for the leadership of our investment committee.

**San Angelo Gives** continues to set records, bringing donors together to support causes that matter most to donors. We seek to break new records this year, so mark your calendar for May 7, 2019, and join thousands supporting a greater vision for the Concho Valley.

I hope you will read this report and review the update on our region's response to the Sonora flood, which occurred on September 21, 2018. 



In 2018, the Foundation awarded over \$8.5 million in grants to 1,840 grantees. These grants included donor advised grants, scholarships, designated and field of interest grants.

Over \$625,000 was awarded to 27 organizations through the Foundation's competitive grant-making program.

# DONOR/FUND HIGHLIGHT: GRETCHEN NOELKE

Anna Gretchen Noelke is a heart-warming example of selflessness and giving.

Desiring to create a lasting legacy for her family's long history in Menard, Gretchen established an endowment fund at the San Angelo Area Foundation in 2014 that benefits her hometown and other charitable causes she desired to support. The predominant charitable theme of her fund is the preservation and enhancement of Menard and its resources.

During the past five years, Gretchen's fund has provided significant funding to Menard through grants for the Menard Library, the Boys & Girls Club of Menard, the Menard Manor, Critter Shack Humane Society of Menard. The fund has also used grants to help the hospital district acquire an ambulance, for preservation and restoration projects at Pioneer Rest Cemetery, and to help the City of Menard remove blighted structures and acquire some much needed equipment.

Gretchen's fund also provides scholarships to Menard High School graduates and notably helped produce two books highlighting stories inspired by Patty Miller's English class, written by Menard students from 1979-1988. The two volumes, Forever Menard and Forever Menard – The Lost Stories, collectively tell the history of Menard. Proceeds from book sales support grants for the Menard community, and the books have been shared around the world, even to Menard's sister city in Cortegana, Spain. Gretchen's goal is to couple her resources with the efficiencies of the San Angelo Area Foundation to give a lasting legacy to the town her Wilhelm/Volkmann family called home since the 1870s. Gretchen's endowment is also able to support several other charitable causes dear to her into perpetuity. The Foundation's good investments of her endowment has enabled her to provide over \$600,000 in grants over these past five years, which will continue to grow in the future. Gretchen's goal for this story would be to encourage others to be generous with the many gifts and blessings God has given all of us, whether small or large, and consider what your legacy of philanthropy could be.
