

LETTER TO THE COMMUNITY

While 2020 was an unprecedented year, the COVID-19 pandemic further amplified the importance of being flexible in our responsiveness and the critical role we play in matching the generosity of the Concho Valley with our communities' greatest needs. Over the past year, the Foundation worked side by side with caring donors, committed nonprofits, and community leaders to inspire ideas and ignite action. Through the support of many who seek to create a permanent and growing source of charitable support, the Foundation received almost \$10 million in contributions and granted more than \$10 million to many great philanthropies in the Concho Valley who provide critical services and tackle difficult community challenges.

Investment returns during the first six months of 2020 were volatile due to market reactions to the pandemic. The Foundation, however, remained focused on our long-term growth and return over a multi-year outlook philosophy, and witnessed a positive performance for the last half of 2020. As a prudent fiduciary, the Foundation continues to focus on quality holdings and long-term performance, allowing endowed funds to distribute 5% of a rolling three-year average to support the charitable causes donors seek to support, even during volatile times.

It was no surprise to see our community rise during San Angelo Gives 2020. Our community displayed heartfelt compassion, throwing kindness like confetti. Perfectly positioned for remote giving, San Angelo Gives inspired donors of all giving levels across our great region to go the distance at a distance, raising a record breaking \$2.6 million for local charities. As we usher in a new phase of normal, the long-term effects of the pandemic will continue to impact our local charities. 

WILLIAM & DON GRIFFIS **Vietnam War Oral History Archive**

During the Vietnam War, many fellow Americans across the nation left the comforts of home to serve the country they loved and to protect the liberties we hold dear. Two of these patriots were San Angelo brothers, William A Griffis III and Don Griffis, who both served in the U.S. Marine Corp. William was killed in action on January 24, 1970, leaving behind his wife and two daughters, one of which was born just 18 hours before his death. Don continued his service until his tour of duty was complete before returning home to San Angelo.

Upon his return from Vietnam, Don fashioned a 50-year legal career as a top trial lawyer until his retirement in 2019. Widely admired for his service to our county and community, Don is a heartwarming example of selflessness and giving. For more

than 20 years, he served as a Scout Master for the Boy Scouts of America and led 60 young men to achieve the prestigious Eagle rank. Recognized for many community honors, Don has made significant contributions to the Concho Valley, volunteering his time, offering his talent, and giving of his treasures.

Inspired by these courageous men, an anonymous donor worked with the San Angelo Area Foundation to pay tribute to the two brothers for their



service and sacrifice by establishing the William and Don Griffis Vietnam War **Oral History Archive Endowment Fund**. The legacy of these American Heroes will support the collection of oral histories that chronicle Vietnam War Veterans living in our area of West Texas through the history department at Angelo State University. Many Vietnam Veterans have incredible memories to share, and this fund will help preserve the voices of those who served our great country and will be a tremendous resource for future generations of students, historians, and the public.

As a philanthropic partner, SAAF can help achieve your giving goals, allowing donors to support causes that inspire giving, while offering the benefit of anonymity. Working together ensures charitable causes will benefit now and for years to come.

Serving over 80 local agencies across the region, the **Concho** Valley Regional Food Bank was able to provide essential hunger relief services to our most vulnerable population during a time of crisis. CVRFB worked with local partners to distribute food to families through "drive-thru" distributions and ensured our youngest community members had adequate food through the Food2kids backpack program while learning virtually.

In 2020, the Foundation awarded \$10 million in grants to 1,473 grantees These grants include donor advised grants, scholarship, designated, and field of interest Through the competitive grant program of the Foundation and emergency grants from the COVID-19 Community Response Fund more than \$487,000 was awarded to more than 50 organizations.

With the mission of ensuring every child in our community has a safe and nurturing home, the **Children's Advocacy Center of Greater West Texas** can provide quick intervention when a child uffers abuse or neglect with the addition of a child therapist. Witnessing a 30% increase in children and families needing services in 2020, CAC can act guickly to help avoid negative outcomes.

With a commitment to nurturing the potential of kids and promoting healthy living, the **YMCA** was able to remain open for neighbors in need, providing childcare for essential personnel needing a safe, structured environment for their families while they continued to work during the early spring of 2020.
